Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2019

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019.

Status of Charity and Governing Document

The Signalling Record Society is established by Constitution. The charity is a registered Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) Charity Commission (No. 1176506).

Aims and activities

To advance the education of the public in all aspects of railway signalling, and all associated science, technology and research, in the British Isles and overseas, in particular but not exclusively by:

- 1. Promoting the study and preservation of information, drawings, photographs and other material through creation of a website and archive;
- 2. Publishing and disseminating the useful results of research;
- 3. Arranging meetings, visits, lectures, exhibitions and similar related activities.

The Signalling Record Society (SRS) had previously been a non-charitable unincorporated society. Its request for charitable status as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation was accepted by the Charity Commissioners on 3 January 2018; at its Annual General Meeting held on 5 May 2018 a resolution was passed to "transfer [its] members, assets, agreements and intellectual property rights ... into the [CIO] ..." This report covers the activities of the CIO for the whole of 2019, and the unincorporated society and the CIO combined through the whole of 2018.

The SRS maintains an archive in order to preserve (in physical or digital form as appropriate) documents and drawings related to railway signalling and make them available to the public. Regular open days are held to allow public access to the physical archive: access is also possible at other times by prior arrangement with the archivist.

The SRS maintains a website available to the public which provides a great deal of information on railway signalling, as well as providing access to the digital archive.

The SRS maintains a photographic collection which is available to the public through the Kidderminster Railway Museum.

The SRS publishes a journal *The Signalling Record* containing some of the results of members' research, and also occasional books on subjects relating to railway signalling.

The SRS arranges meetings and visits to locations of railway signalling interest, and attends relevant exhibitions.

The Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commissioners on public benefit.

Trustees and Office Bearers

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2019

Appointment of Trustees

The Trustees may at any time decide to appoint a new Trustee, whether in place of a current Trustee who has retired or as an additional Trustee, provided that the limit of 12 Trustees has not been exceeded. At every subsequent annual general meeting, at least one-half of the Trustees shall retire from office. The number of Trustees must not exceed 12 and must not fall below 3. The charity Trustees will make available to each new Trustee, on or before his/her first appointment:

- A copy of this constitution and any amendments made to it; and
- A copy of the CIO's latest Trustees' annual report and statement of accounts.

Achievements and performance

During the year the main achievements of the charity included:

- The (unincorporated) Signalling Record Society was founded in 1969, so 2019 was the Society's 50th anniversary year. Several special events were held to commemorate this, one of which was attended by the only survivor of the four founding members.
- Nine public open days were held at the SRS archive; the archive was additionally opened by special arrangement or for working purposes on 18 other days. The total attendance on these days was over 190 persons.
- The SRS website was visited on 126,563 occasions during the year, with a total of 610,765 page views.
- A new enlarged and improved format for *The Signalling Record* was introduced in Spring 2019; during the year four issues were published, totalling 160 pages. In addition four issues of *SRS News* were produced, totalling 64 pages.
- Two new publications were produced during the year; a back list of over 50 publications is available for sale to the public. The SRS also offers individual signal box diagrams for sale to the public; new diagrams continued to be added to the list during 2019.
- The SRS has an Enquiries Officer who acts as first point of contact for enquiries from the public, directing them where possible to the appropriate experts; he dealt with 58 enquiries during 2019.
- The SRS works jointly with the National Railway Museum in areas of mutual interest. The SRS website gives access to the videos produced under the joint FARSAP (Film Archive of Railway Signalling and People) project; these videos were viewed a total of 7,316 times in 2019.
- The SRS organised 8 visits to signalling installations during 2019, covering both National Rail and the
 heritage sector. There were four meetings (in London, Kenilworth, Crewe and York) at which talks
 were given, and the SRS was represented at two exhibitions (at Telford and Birmingham) where the
 public could seek expert advice.

Financial review

Results for the year

The financial statements for the year are set out in pages 5 to 8. The Receipts and Payments Account on page 5 reflects a net increase in cash for the year of £3,838 (2018 Restated: £4,537).

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2019

Reserves

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately three months unrestricted expenditure that allows sufficient funds to enable the ongoing work of the charity to be maintained. The General Fund on page 6 at 31 December 2019 amounted to £40,631 (2018 Restated: £37,832) which is above the required level.

Total reserves, including designated and restricted funds, amounted to £61,615 (2018 Restated: £57,777).

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2019

1. Accounting policies

Basis of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared on a receipts and payments basis.

Receipts and Payments Account

For the purpose of the Receipts and Payments account as shown on page 5, funds are defined as follows:

Unrestricted funds comprise grants and other income received for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated funds comprise those funds which the Trustees have designated for specific purposes. The funds held within the designated funds are expected to be used over the next 24 months.

Restricted funds comprise income which has been received for the objects of the charity and specified for a restricted purpose within these objects by the donor.

Explanation of funds

The General fund represents all income and expenditure relating to the primary focus activities of the charity, other than those for which funding is restricted.

The *Enterprise fund* represents funds intended to allow the SRS to undertake projects, such as publising where some preliminary investment is required and some time may elapse before this investment is recovered. Some of the funds are kept to guard against future conditions beyond the SRS's control which might increase costs or reduce income, to ensure that the SRS can withstand such variations.
